TYPES OF CHURCH PLANTS by Wayne Proctor, Church Planting and Revitalization

As I write this, I'll be on my way to Greenville to participate in a "vision tour" developed by Dennis Conner, our State Convention Church Strategist. I am excited about the learning opportunity. I have been asked to speak about Albemarle Plantation.

Most church plants are intentional plants, starting from nothing but prayer and a vision. Both Redemption City Church and One Church are intentional plants supported to some degree by SBC SEND and NC SEND. This monies through NAMB help support many church planters. These plants began with a need, and a vision. In our CBA, one mission field is largely collegiate, the other is with working people on an island.

Another great example of an intentional church plant is Access Point, whereby leadership came from a well established church, with the pastor's blessing. Certainly Bob Young invested heavily in discipling A.J. Layton and some others in leadership. This is probably the ideal church plant.

Then there are groups of Christian who come out of a church, or several churches, who join together to create a new church. Usually this new group doesn't have a regular building to meet in, and may begin in a home, or a garage, or some type of community facility. I expect that Albemarle Plantation could come from such a group or groups.

Finally, there are greater church planting movements which are making an important impact in specific communities. For example, there is the Praetorian network, reaching military communities (based upon Phil. 1:13). Some of these churches go by the name Pillar, and during the week of prayer for 2025, one of these is based near Jacksonville/Sneads Ferry to minister to Marine families from Fort Lejeune. Another such Pillar church exists near Havelock. And there are churches such as Summit, who have planted hundreds of churches in the USA and in other countries. And there are churches that have been "replanted," such as Nags Head Church. Former pastor, Rick Lawrenson, wrote about Nags Head story in <u>The Replanted Church.</u>

Blackwell Memorial Baptist Church is looking for an ordained bi-vocational minister. Being bi-vocational, the pastor will need to be able to supplement his income. We are an older congregation seeking to grow by welcoming multigenerational families. We are located in the water-front town of Elizabeth City, North Carolina.
